Why did you decide to join Leading Excellence Maryborough in 2018?

Have you forged new connections or friendships as a result of joining?

I love walking down the street or into an event and now almost always knowing someone whether a participant or presenter from the LEM program; I feel much more connected and able to reach out to others when I have a challenge or opportunity to discuss.

Has completing the program opened up any new opportunities for you?

As a result of getting involved in LEM, I now participate in the Innovation, Technology and Entrepreneurship subcommittee of the Committee for Maryborough where we're exploring the exciting opportunity of the Maryborough Ideas Festival. II was also recently appointed to the board of directors for one of the local secondary schools, in part thanks to the mentorship and skills I was able to experience and build through LEM.

What do you see as Central Goldfields strengths?

It's all in the name, I think we are centrally located to not only other regional and metro centres but also to an amazing network of smaller hubs that we need to better unite and utilise; and the area is an absolute goldfield of committed people with such potential, as a community we just need to better connect and build from that potential.

How do you see the role of community leaders in responding to challenges, or areas of need in the community?

Community leaders are the string they can weave the many areas of our community together, their role being to connect ideas, people and ultimately potential solutions together to meet the needs specific to that community.

Ruth is a successful community leader, committed volunteer and activist for positive change. Through her business as a leadership coach and mentor, Ruth supports community leaders who want to make a positive difference with a focus on rural communities and the local government sector.

As someone who 'gets' the joys and challenges of being a leading public figure, Ruth is passionate about supporting emerging/established leaders to step forward and embrace the challenges while keeping sight of their vision. She has a natural talent for handling diverse relationships with warmth and positivity.

Ruth is a self-described 'political nerd' and as an experienced campaigner, she runs programs and training on how to get elected. Ruth was twice elected to Baw Baw Council including a term as Mayor and has supported various candidates to run for local, state and federal office including helping coordinate the celebrated Independent-for-Indi campaigns which elected Ruth's sister, Cathy McGowan to federal parliament in 2013 & 2016. In 2019, Ruth published Get Elected - a step by step campaign guide to winning public office which she wrote to support independent candidates to run for office at a local. state or federal level.



Ruth has more than 25 years' experience in developing and leading adult training through a successful career as a senior manager in the Victorian Public Service and her own consulting business. She is an excellent facilitator, communicator and experienced public speaker. As a volunteer on many not-for-profit committees at a state and national level Ruth was honoured with an Order of Australia Medal (OAM) in 2014 for her community contribution. Ruth has three adult children and continues to be an active volunteer in her community in West Gippsland where she lives on a small rural property with her husband Paul.

Influence, Motivation and Change

Community Leadership draws on the leader's personal power in influencing others to work together in ways that produce positive outcomes. In this workshop we explore the attributes of community leaders as compared to leaders and managers at work.

At work, leadership is often associated with positional power, or formal authority to influence change. We take a look at some key skills and attributes we can practice to build referent, or relational power, to inspire, motivate and influence others to volunteer their time and energy to create change. We explore the drivers that call people to volunteer roles and reflect on ways to celebrate, value and develop the skills of volunteers in our community groups.

Why did you choose to participate in Leading Excellence Maryborough 2019?

I think the connection came through my manager at Council. Prior to that I'd heard about it last year from people participating in the program. Since moving to Maryborough I'd done a few programs through my wife's workplace. I was interested to find out what I had to offer the community. The more I found out about our local community- the more I understood where I could contribute as a volunteer in community groups around the place.

That's a great reason to get involved. Where does your passion to contribute to community come from?

I've always had an interest in contributing to community. I've been fortunate to grow up and been involved in lots of leadership courses, including international leadership courses in Canberra for a couple of years. I met my wife at a leadership course in Sydney. Growing up we were part of Sikh Community's that were good at making sure you're proud of your own roots and background. We were able to explore our personal values and how they play out in broader communities and how we can enrich them and then contribute more broadly out from there. Now having two young children, I'm keen to understand how we can get involved in supporting our local community that they will grow up in.

How would you describe the benefits of participating in Leading Excellence Maryborough?

I'd say I've benefited from social connections in the group. It's been a great way to get to know people and build a network. Becoming aware of the different types of work being done by community groups. I'm learning a lot about the region. The session we had about the history of the town helped me understand where we are today.

What inspired you develop a community project introducing social badminton to the area?

The idea for our community projectto start social badminton night came from Rajhita (also LEM participant in 2019.) We wanted to reach out to a broader audience and putting it out there to see if anyone else can get involved. We're exploring a few different options to get the word out.

How did the program help you learn about the local community and where you could make a contribution?

Before we came to Maryborough, we had no idea about the stereotype of 'Scaryborough.' We moved and our hosts who helped us settle in encouraged us not to be put off by that stereotype. This program helped me understand why that stereotype exists and the amazing amount of work that has been done to try to shift that.

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Understanding the perception some people have of the town has changed my dialogue with friends and family. I actively talk the town up. Besides the work opportunities it is a great place to live. At the same time, I've got an understanding of the town's background, of the social problems that still exist.

Did you sign up for the program with others you knew?

When I began the program, I knew Anna, my manager well. I didn't know anyone else. The program has been a great way to make friends. I enjoy being around positive people who want to do good things....that elevates you.

What advice would you offer someone considering getting involved in 2020?

Be open and give it a shot. The socialising and learning is great. I had my own limited knowledge being a newcomer. For anyone else, come and learn, participate and share your knowledge. You'll end up making a great bunch of friends. Hopefully ife-long friends. If for no other reason that's a great one to get involved.

Why did you choose to participate in Leading Excellence Maryborough 2018?

I think it's the fact that someone suggests you should go. It's a reason to have a bit more of a look at your approach to leadership. I wouldn't have been aware of it if it hadn't been offered by my boss at the time. The opportunity to be a part of the program came through the Committee for Maryborough. It brought back ideas about what my Mum had done. She was very community oriented. Mum passed away recently and had been so generous with her time. So many people are generous in our community.

Did attending the program days influence your practice of leadership?

Most definitely. The information about advocacy was valuable. I hadn't been involved in advocating for my community before. The program gave me an awareness of the structure of things. I gained the knowledge and skills to serve as a board member. I now understand how Council works and how one would stand for council. The information and knowledge about how to do that was great.

Did any of the speakers stand out for you?

Each speaker who came to talk with us was quite remarkable in sharing their own stories. Yvonne Wrigglesworth was a stand out for me. She was someone like me who hadn't been involved in community and then after completing the Loddon Murray Community Leadership Program became very involved in community. Jude Hannah was great in sharing her stories, that she grew up in the Loddon Shire and then went on to advocate for communities at an international level.

Did you sign up for the program with others you knew?

I only knew a handful of participants before I started. It's great that now I can go into the supermarket and say hello to all these people I didn't know before. I'm about do some work for the Committee for Maryborough and I need to make some phone calls an onboard volunteers. I'm reaching out to the Leading Excellence Maryborough network as a starting point.

Has completing the program opened up any new opportunities for you?

I would never have thought about serving on a board before completing the course. I was offered an opportunity to join the Board of the Committee for Maryborough after I finished the leadership program. It's been a big eye opener. Maria Smith provided support and inspiration to get involved in doing things for our community.

What about the connections with other participants in your Leading Excellence <u>Maryboro</u>ugh group?

There have been great opportunities for networking. With Mary and Windsor at Edlyn and Jess at True Foods. LEM creates those networks that you would never have thought of or known where to start. For example, one of the other LEM participants explored solar for their business. The ability to go and have a look at what another company has done and then throw ideas around, like what would it look like if we made Maryborough Businesses solar efficient? We (the Committee for Maryborough) has been exploring the potential for the majority of Maryborough's energy requirements to be generated from renewable forms of energy. That could attract new businesses to operate n the town. It might attract new esidents.

That's a really exciting idea. How valuable to be identifying those game changing projects together.

I'm also sitting on the Council's review board for Central Goldfield's Economic Development Strategy. That's been really interesting. Getting to see first hand as Council receive expressions of interest. Seeing both sides of the process- seeing the inside Council run process and then listening to what people in the community are saying about the strategy and thinking about how to bring those things together.

Were you surprised by experiences in the program at all?

The fact that there are so many people who want to do good things in our community has surprised me. There are so many who are positive. We can all get stuck in our daily grind and be influenced by those around us. Spending time with other participants in LEM opened my eyes. Everyone was wanting to make a difference for their community. When you're surrounded by people who want to make a difference, it's easy to start to think like that yourself and then go out and do it.

Visiting program days in LEM this year, its been great to see another group of people inspired to do great things. I really enjoyed that, coming back this year and hearing about what other people were doing.

Would you recommend the experience to others?

Governance 101



Why did you choose to participate in Leading Excellence Maryborough 2019?

I was interested in promoting Dunolly as a great place to live and to visit. I wanted to be a better leader in the Dunolly community. I wanted to encourage other leaders to come through in the town. As a community we need to support those people who'd like to get more involved in the town, to encourage them and help them build their skills.

Did attending the program days influence your practice of leadership?

I found each of the program days good value, especially the leadership summit in Bendigo. Jason Clarke was inspiring about being the change you want to see in the world. I really enjoyed visiting each of the smaller communities that had achieved some big wins. Newstead was a stand out for me, a small group of volunteers have worked together well there to attract tourism and promote their town as a great place to live.

Did any of the speakers stand out for you?

Jason Clarke from Minds at Work. The volunteers are Maryborough Community House, their level of care for others in the community and the volume of work they do is amazing. Gilbert Rouchouster from the Village Well was great. The workshop on the difference between Advocacy, Agency and Activism was helpful. It's good to learn the process of how to be an effective advocate for your community.

Did you sign up for the program with others you knew?

I knew Susan Day from Dunolly. I didn't know other participants well. It was good to meet new people. I found I had a bit in common with the guys from True Foods, it was great meeting Thomas and Rajhita, as their work in food technology has many similarities for me in the Bakery.

What did you think about the process of developing a Community Project?

The workshop on developing a community project was valuable. The course provided an outline in how to go about planning a project, writing a project charter. I applied for funding for my community project Investing Dunolly Water Basin, from Coliban Water. My project seeks to develop a walking track up to the Basin. I wasn't successful this time, the project only just missed out on being funded. It was valuable to have a completed project charter, (that we worked on in the leadership program) to guide the application. It's also been great to see the range of projects others were able to bring to life. Having a Park Run in Maryborough now is brilliant. Seeing other participants from our leadership program get their projects off the ground has been very positive.

What's next for Dunolly?

I reckon Dunolly is in a good space at the moment. We've got to keep pushing along. The community arts project has been great for the town. Some of the art has been controversial and so it's drawn out a lot of conversation and interest across the whole town. Its engaged lots of people, that's probably a good thing. We're also busy with gold prospectors visiting Dunolly. I really want to push cycling as a driver for increasing tourism to Dunolly, we've got terrific cycling trails in Dunolly so it would be building on our existing strengths as a community. Developing the walking/cycling track up to the Water Basin would add value to the existing cycling trail that then leads into the bush.
